As a hart longs for flowing streams, so longs my soul for thee, O God. Psalm 42:1 (Revised Standard Version).

Just like a deer longs for water, we long for our God. This Lenten season is about sitting in that longing, spending time at the stream drinking in Jesus.

Our season of Lent started out with the Gospel story of Jesus being driven out by the same Spirit that alighted on him at his baptism. There in the wilderness Jesus was tested by the devil for forty days. I think we understand wilderness stories better now. We have spent far more than 40 days in the pandemic wilderness of Covid-19. We have had struggles, despair, anger, and hurt. Once in a while, we have even found an oasis of beauty and joy. We have also had desperate moments of clawing at the ground trying to find the safe places, and then some caverns of acceptance, and some still moments of calm and peace.

At some point we will come to the edge of this wilderness and a world more familiar to us will emerge. Then a new adventure of rediscovering a world that we left behind will begin. By the time we make it to the edge, this wilderness wandering will seem much more familiar. Even though it is filled with danger, it will be the old world that will feel like a jungle, one we will have to learn to re-navigate. Part of our time in the wilderness is to grow closer to God. In the more unfamiliar land, where our ways are not clear, we lean on Jesus to be our Good Shepherd. We lean on Jesus to create a path to lead us out. In the wilderness we long for God in a different way than we did before. We would like freedom from the danger, ability to travel, to see people, and this and that – we have too many wants to list. However, while we are still here in the midst of this time, God stands before us like a stream in the desert. Do you long for Christ?

Lent is a time to be hyper-vigilant in the wilderness. It is a time we set aside to search out Christ and to follow the path to the cross. It is a purposeful time to grow closer to God, to lean on God, to listen and communicate with God through prayer. It is a time to long for Jesus, and thirst for God's Spirit to fill you.

So, stand by the waters, and drink. The cool waters are filled with a hope and a promise of Jesus. Wade in the waters of grace and pause to experience being filled by love.

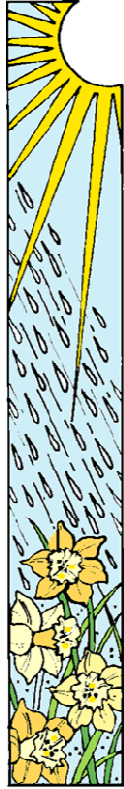
Adopt-A Room update

Tuning in

As I listened to Ruth Ladage read the Transfiguration gospel, a phrase that jumped out at me was “Listen to him!” Listen to Jesus speak to you. But sometimes interpreting the message is a challenge, especially when you’re in a situation that you didn’t ask for and have no control of, like one summer day in the 80s back when the office was a tiny part of the little parsonage next to the church.

A young mom I didn’t know came in with five children under five and immediately the small area became alive with their noisy exploration. The youngest howled without ceasing in the mother’s arms. She said she’d changed her mind about her boyfriend, who’d moved south to work in Salem, and she wanted to join him there to reconcile their relationship. I listened to her and meanwhile the children opened drawers and cupboards, sifted papers, yanked books and files to the floor and finally ransacked the metal wastebasket, where I had just placed stencils (long plastic film sheets covered with wet ink) off the mimeograph. I finally reacted – the mom never said a word of remonstrance – and leaped to warn the little ones away. When the wastebasket was put up high, the baby did his share by exploding his diaper which cascaded down his mom’s arms just missing the front of her T-shirt. She had no clean diapers with her, even in her car, and seemed to expect me to cope for her. We were between interns so I donated a somewhat frayed but clean hand towel from the kitchen drawer, handed her a scotch tape dispenser and pointed the way to the bathroom.

When they were finally gone, I paused in the cleanup and asked Jesus what on earth I might have done otherwise, but heard only laughing.

A distinct voice would have been helpful when the homeless man who always wore dark glasses displayed a 15” knife and sat on the floor idly turning it while he talked, or when a Good Samaritan brought in a teenage girl hitchhiker so spaced out she couldn’t speak coherently, or when a caller told me she had spent a \$3000 tax refund check on a two-week spree of elegant living and shopping but was now destitute and of course had no family to help her. These experiences have left me feeling dismayed and helpless, but looking back I realize my listening led me to live my faith. That’s all we can do; listen and live like we heard!
